In technical writing it is appropriate to use the active form of these verbs (“demonstrates”) instead of the passive form (“demonstrated in”).

Versions of English Dictionaries

There exist differences between the English that is used in Australia, Canada, India, New Zealand, the United Kingdom (British English), and the United States of America (American English). One difference in punctuation is mentioned earlier; in North America the closing quotation mark encloses the punctuation that may appear at the end of the quoted material (like “this.”). The opposite is done elsewhere (like “this”.) There are also differences in the spelling of some words, like “colour” and “color.” Canadian English, which is a mix of British English and American English, is adopted in these documents. The following table contrasts the Canadian and American English:

Canadian English	American English

Some words have alternative spellings in Canadian English, including the following:

acknowledgment	acknowledgement
aging	ageing

specialty	speciality

Some words have alternative spellings in other versions of English, but not in Canadian English. These words include analogue, which is spelled analog elsewhere.
